

707 (b) Adjudications, DJJ Commitments, and Secure Track Sustained Totals

- 36 707(b) referrals sustained during the reporting period across 33 individual youth
- <u>0</u> youth were committed to DJJ
- <u>0</u> youth returned from DJJ
- 1 reinstated commitment to SYTF
- <u>5</u> new commitments to SYTF


Most Serious Offense for Youth with New Secure Track Commitments (n = 5)



Youth Eligible for SYTF Under WIC 875(a)

- 156 youth with a sustained
 707(b) offense were active to probation during the quarter
 - <u>138</u> (88%) youth were male
 - <u>18</u> (12%) youth were female
 - <u>112</u> (72%) youth were Black
 - 33 (21%) youth were Hispanic


Youth Age 14+ w/ Sustained 707(b) Offenses Based on the most Recent Referral (n = 156)



Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF*

- 13 youth were committed to SYTF as of June 30, 2024
 - 100% of youth were court ordered
 - 100% of youth were male
 - 46% of youth were from Oakland
 - The average age of youth was <u>17.8</u>
 - The average length of time in SYTF 226.8 days

Race of Youth Committed to SYTF (n = 13)



Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF Cont.*

- For the 13 youth, the average
 - Number of referrals prior to SYTF commitment was <u>7.8</u>
 - Number of bookings prior to SYTF commitment was <u>5.2</u>
 - Number of true findings prior to SYTF commitment was 3.7
 - Time between 1st referral and SYTF commitment was 4.0 years

Step-downs and Closures*

- As of June 30, 2024,
 - <u>8</u> youth were on step-down from SYTF to a less restrictive program
 - These programs included step-down to Camp, GPS, community supervision, and interstate compact.
 - 16 youth had their Secure Track grant closed
 - This includes youth with jurisdiction transfers and youth whose cases were closed out with the ACPD due to a transfer on
 interstate compact (IC), in addition to youth whose cases were closed due to their term ending or being discharged early.
 - As of June 30, 2024, 3 youth were closed out due to jurisdictional and IC transfers.
