

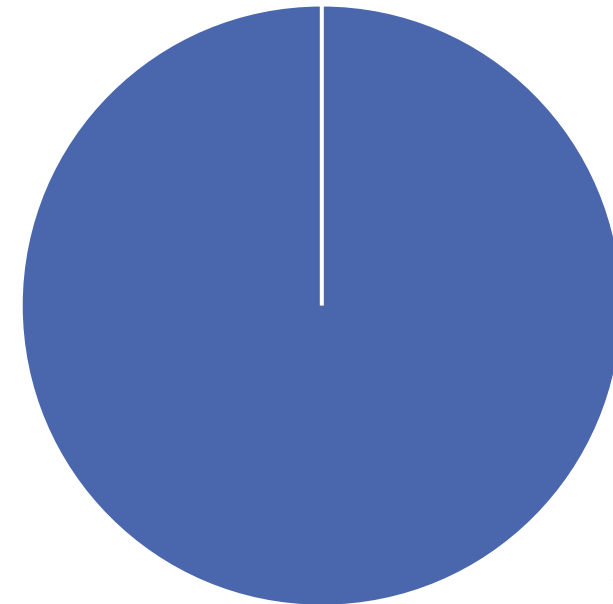

707 (b) Adjudications, DJJ Commitments, and Secure Track Sustained Totals (Cumulative)

Most Serious Offense for Youth with New Secure Track Commitments (n = 1)

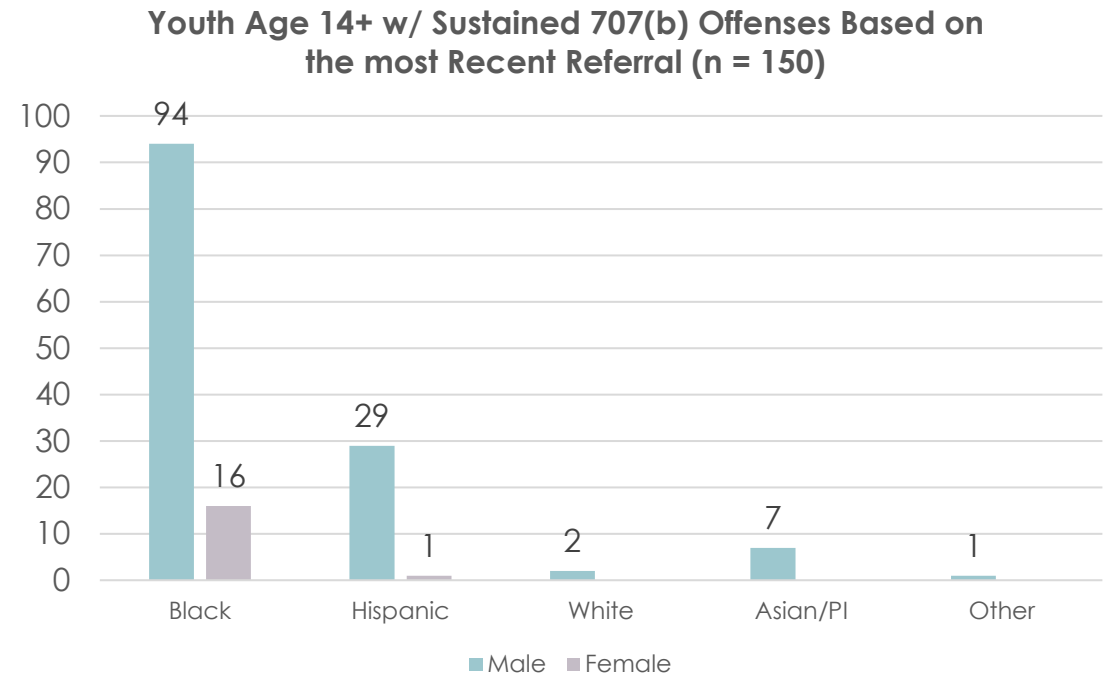
- 12 707(b) referrals sustained during the reporting period across 11 individual youth
- 0 youth were committed to DJJ
- 0 youth returned from DJJ
- 0 reinstated commitment to SYTF
- 1 new commitments to SYTF

Youth Eligible for SYTF Under WIC 875(a)

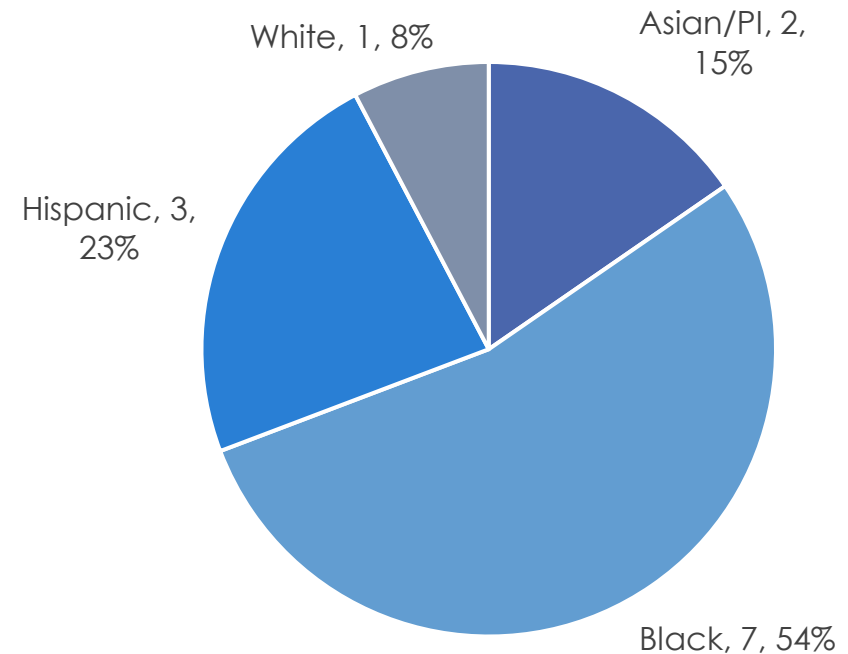
- 150 youth with a sustained 707(b) offense were active to probation during the quarter
 - 133 (89%) youth were male
 - 17 (11%) youth were female
 - 110 (73%) youth were Black
 - 30 (20%) youth were Hispanic



Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF*

- 13 youth were committed to SYTF as of March 31, 2025
 - 100% of youth were court ordered
 - 92% of youth were male
 - 8% of youth were female
 - 38% of youth were from Oakland
 - The average age of youth was 18.0
 - The average length of time in SYTF 350.0 days

Race of Youth Committed to SYTF (n = 13)

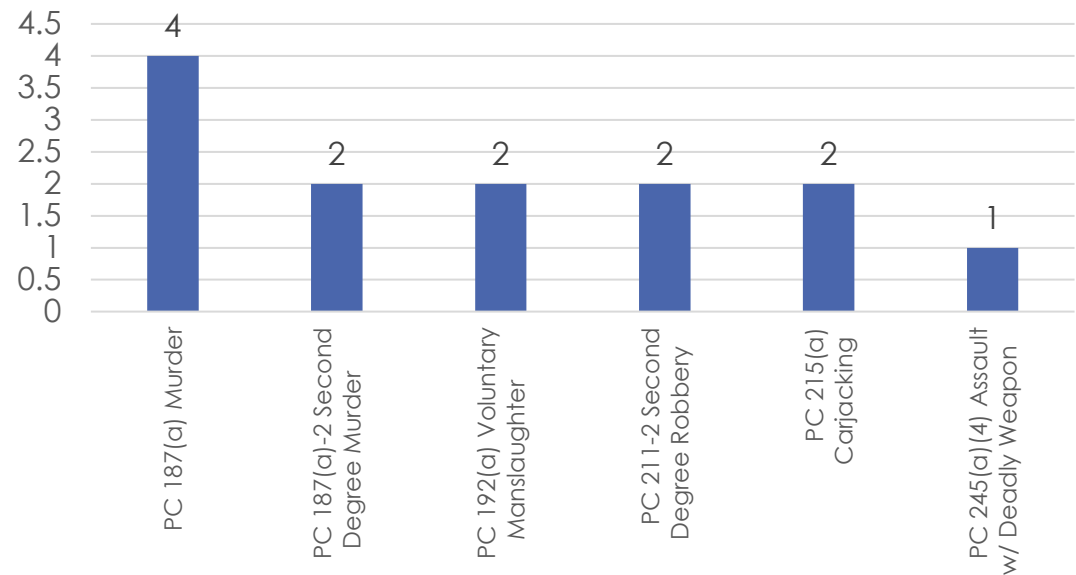

Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF Cont.*

- For the 13 youth, the average
 - Number of *referrals* prior to SYTF commitment was 4.9
 - Number of *bookings* prior to SYTF commitment was 3.2
 - Number of *true findings* prior to SYTF commitment was 3.2
 - Time between 1st referral and SYTF commitment was 2.9 years

Step-downs and Closures*

- As of March 31, 2025,
 - 4 youth were on step-down from SYTF to a less restrictive program
 - These programs included step-down to Camp, GPS, community supervision, and interstate compact.
 - 23 youth had their Secure Track grant closed
 - This includes youth with jurisdiction transfers and youth whose cases were closed out with the ACPD due to a transfer on interstate compact (IC), in addition to youth whose cases were closed due to their term ending, being discharged early, or an unsuccessful completion.
 - As of March 31, 2025, 3 youth were closed out due to jurisdictional and IC transfers & 1 youth was released back to DJJ due to 779 motion being denied.
