Hello and welcome home to Alameda County! You are a valued member of our community and you have been missed – as a family member, friend, coworker, and neighbor.

As you reenter the community, I want to tell you that the Alameda County Probation Department is here to support you every step of the way.

Our probation officers are trained to help you set goals and connect you to resources that will help you achieve them. The Alameda County Probation Department contracts with many community-based organizations that can provide supportive services in areas like housing, employment, family relationships, education, and substance abuse treatment. We also have funds to

assist you with paying for rent, food, and transportation.

This is a new beginning for you, and we are here to help. Things that have happened to you or that you have done in the past do not define you and should not limit your future possibilities. I believe very strongly that certain life circumstances can cause good people to make bad decisions. My hope is that you view this reentry period as the beginning of a new chapter in your life - one that is defined by healthy and safe choices.

As a society, we still have a lot of work to do to correct systemic racism and disparities in our education, housing, employment, health care, and criminal justice systems. The Alameda County Probation Department is committed to reducing racial and ethnic disparities in our community supervision system and to helping our clients overcome the impacts of past discrimination and inequality.

The reentry journey will not always be easy. You will face setbacks and obstacles, and sometimes you may feel like giving up. In those moments, please know that there are many people who want to help you succeed, both within the Alameda County Probation Department and within other county agencies and community organizations. Don't be afraid to ask for help as you navigate your reentry journey.

Remember that you are a survivor – of incarceration and of your past experiences. Being a survivor makes you resilient, and it means you have the inner strength needed to overcome challenges. It also means that your participation in the Alameda County community will make us all stronger.

I wish you much happiness and personal fulfillment in the days and years to come. Please stay safe and be well.

ABOUT THE DIRECTORY

The Welcome Home: Alameda County Reentry Resource Directory was developed by the Alameda County Probation Department for the purpose of helping clients make a successful transition from prison or jail back to the community. The Welcome Home Directory provides contact and service information for county agencies and community-based organizations that support Alameda County residents with things like housing, employment, education, mental health, substance use, and family relationships. Listings in each section are not exhaustive but rather a selection of the resources that might be useful for individuals on probation in Alameda County.

The Welcome Home Directory is a project of the Pathways Home Initiative, a first-of-its-kind partnership between the Alameda County Probation Department and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation that aims to improve the reentry process for clients returning to Alameda County from prison and jail. The initiative was partially funded by a Second Chance Act grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance.

HOW TO USE THE WELCOME HOME DIRECTORY

The Welcome Home Directory has been developed to help you find the services and resources you need to succeed on probation once you are back home. Listings marked as an **ACPD contracted service provider** are funded by the Alameda County Probation Department and offer free services to probation clients. These organizations will give probation clients preferred access.

The Welcome Home Directory is not a complete list of all resources in Alameda County, but it is a starting point as you plan your reentry. For more information and additional resource listings, you can dial 2-1-1 from your phone or visit www.211alamedacounty.org.

If you have questions about any of the programs listed in this directory or aren't sure where to begin, you can start in the *General support services* section of this directory, which has listings for organizations that can help you navigate all the available services and programs. Your probation officer is also available to help you find services.





ALAMEDA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Alameda County is governed by a five-member Board of Supervisors, each of whom is elected from a separate district where they live. Terms of office for supervisors are four years. Every two years, one of the supervisors is chosen as Board president. The Board President presides at all meetings of the Board and appoints committees to handle work involving the major programs of the County.

The Board performs the legislative and executive functions of the County's government. The duties of the Board of Supervisors are as follows:

- Appoint most County officers and employees, except elected officials.
- Provide for the compensation of all County officials and employees.
- Create officers, boards, and commissions as needed.
- Award all contracts for public works.
- Adopt an annual budget.
- Provide, publish, and enforce a complete code of rules prescribing the duties for each County department.
- Have an annual audit made of all County accounts, books, and records.
- Supervise the operations of departments and exercise executive and administrative authority throughout County government.
- Serve as an appellate body for employee grievances, planning, and zoning.

The Board of Supervisors meets at 10:45 a.m. on Tuesdays for meetings that are open to the public at the County Administration Building, located at 1221 Oak Street in Oakland (5th Floor Board Chambers). Community members are encouraged to attend these meetings. Community members may also visit their supervisor's county or district offices.



GENERAL SUPPORT SERVICES

Most of the organizations and resources provided in this directory are focused on specific areas of assistance, like housing or employment. However, there are also several organizations that can help you with the reentry process in general. Staff at these organizations can provide guidance on the reentry process, explain the services that are available to you, connect you to resources, and provide a helping hand when things feel overwhelming.



CENTER OF REENTRY EXCELLENCE

The Alameda County Probation Department funds a drop-in resource center called the Center of Reentry Excellence (CORE). CORE is operated by the Felton Institute in partnership with Roots Community Health Center.

Counselors at CORE are available to help you access all of the services listed below.

- Job training and placement
- Counseling and mental health
- Drug and alcohol treatment
- Housing
- Legal assistance
- Childcare and parenting
- Benefit enrollment



ALAMEDA COUNTY FAMILY JUSTICE CENTER

The Alameda County Family Justice Center is made up of over 30 onsite and 50 offsite agencies and programs that provide support to individuals and families who have experienced domestic violence, sexual assault and exploitation, child abuse, elder or dependent adult abuse, or stalking.



HOUSING

The cost of housing in the Bay Area is very high and it can be challenging to find an affordable place to live. However, there are a lot of people and organizations available to help you find affordable and stable housing.

The Alameda County Probation Department funds several housing programs for clients on probation, so talk to your probation officer as soon as possible if you need housing.



TYPES OF HOUSING

Emergency shelters

Emergency shelters provide an immediate place to stay for short periods of time. They often provide connections to services and options for longer-term housing.

Transitional housing

Transitional housing is a type of temporary accommodation that typically includes supportive services like job training, counseling, and referrals to services in the community. Transitional housing is intended to move individuals and families into permanent housing within 24 months or less.

Permanent supportive housing

Permanent supportive housing is intended to help homeless persons with disabilities live independently. Individuals are connected to permanent, affordable housing and provided supportive services in areas such as mental health and substance use.

Sober living facilities

Sober living facilities are special housing programs that offer accommodation in an environment that is free of drugs and alcohol. They provide various services for residents, including substance abuse treatment, support groups, and counseling. See the *Drug and alcohol treatment* section for more information about sober living facilities in Alameda County.

Permanent housing

Permanent housing refers to an apartment or house that you rent on your own. Visit the Alameda County Housing Portal to search for affordable housing options in your area: housing.acgov.org. You can also use the following sites to search for local rental options:

For apartment or house rentals, the person or company renting the property will likely ask you to complete a rental application. As part of the application process, they will check your credit history. They may also ask to speak with a reference – someone who has rented to you before and can confirm that you are a good tenant.

If you are approved to rent an apartment or house, you will usually need to provide a security deposit and sign a lease for a specific period of time.

HOUSING RIGHTS

In 2020, the cities of Berkeley and Oakland passed laws making it illegal for landlords to conduct criminal background checks on potential tenants. If a landlord in Berkeley or Oakland asks you to complete a criminal background check, you should call one of the following fair-housing nonprofits to seek assistance in contesting the background check request and reporting the landlord:

In other cities in Alameda County, landlords may require a criminal background check prior to renting an apartment or house.

Talk with your probation officer about ways to discuss your criminal history with the landlord to help them feel comfortable renting to you.

If you need support from a legal advocate, contact any of the organizations listed above.

These organizations can help with eviction notices, trouble with getting repairs completed, disputes with landlords, security deposit retrieval, and discrimination due to race, ethnic origin, marital status, sex, religion, disability status, and having children. They can also provide information on your rights and responsibilities as a tenant.

There are many organizations in Alameda County that provide free hot meals, groceries, and food delivery services for anyone who wants it.

IDENTIFICATION DOCUMENTS

There are three important documents that you'll want to make sure you have soon after you are released: a birth certificate, a social security card, and a California ID. You will need these documents to apply for public benefits, secure employment, and open a bank account.

CONTRACTOR OF CURSE O

If you want to operate a motor vehicle, you'll need a driver's license.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE

Your birth certificate is important because it proves your legal name, date of birth, and place of birth. If you were born in the United States, it also proves your U.S. citizenship.

Your birth certificate is required to obtain a social security card and a California ID.

Requesting your birth certificate. If you were born in Alameda County, you can order a copy of your birth certificate online from the Alameda County Clerk's Office: www.acgov.org/auditor/clerk/bdm. If you were born in another county, you will need to contact that county's clerk-recorder's office, either by phone or online. Most counties make it easy to submit a request for your birth certificate online using www.vitalchek.com.

\$

Cost. In Alameda County, obtaining a copy of your birth certificate costs \$30. If you order the birth certificate online through www.vitalchek.com, there is an additional fee of \$12.95. The Probation Department can cover these costs for you – just talk to your probation officer.

SOCIAL SECURITY CARD

To apply for a social security card, whether a new card or a replacement card, you will need to complete Form SS-5, found online at www.ssa.gov/forms/ss-5.pdf (last page).

Requesting an original social security card. If you have never applied for a social security card before, you will need to provide two forms of identification:

- 1 Your birth certificate
- 2 A California ID or driver's license

You will need to apply for the card in person at an Alameda County Social Security Office. See the *Public benefits* section for a list and map of all office locations. Schedule an appointment ahead of time to avoid a long wait by calling (800) 772-1213. Bring your completed SS-5 form, birth certificate, and California ID or driver's license with you to the appointment.



Requesting a replacement social security card. If you have had a social security card before and need a replacement card, you only need to provide your birth certificate when applying in person at an Alameda County Social Security Office. If you want to apply online, you'll still need to provide your California ID or driver's license. You can apply for a replacement social security card online at www.ssa.gov/myaccount/replacement-card.html after creating an account.

Cost. There is no cost to obtain a new or replacement social security card.



CALIFORNIA ID CARD

All California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) facilities offer the CAL-ID Program, which allows some people to apply for a California ID card before being released from prison. You can apply for a California ID through the CAL-ID Program prior to your release if you:

- ✓ Have a social security number
- Have been issued a California ID or driver's license from the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) within the last 10 years
- On't have an active felony hold, warrant, or detainer that will result in additional incarceration following your release

The CAL-ID Program also requires that you have an address where you can receive mail. If you meet the criteria above but do not have an address, you can use the Alameda County Probation Department's Oakland office as your address: 400 Broadway, Oakland, CA 94607.


If you aren't eligible for the CAL-ID Program, you'll need to apply for a California ID as soon as you are released. Your probation officer can help you schedule an appointment at the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

There are three kinds of ID cards you can receive:



Standard ID card:

The standard ID card can be used to verify an individual's identity and age.



REAL ID card:

In addition to verifying your identify and age, a REAL ID will be required if you want to board a flight starting on May 3, 2023.



Senior citizen ID card:

Individuals 62 years old or older are eligible for a no-fee senior citizen ID card.

When you visit the DMV to apply for your California ID card, you'll need to have the following things with you:

- 🧭 Birth certificate
- ✓ Social security number
- One document that proves you live in California (rent or lease agreement, utility bill, insurance document, employment document, etc.). This document must have your first and last name, and the mailing address must match the mailing address listed on the California ID application. Talk to your probation officer if you aren't sure which document to bring. The Alameda County Probation Department can also provide you with a document that proves your California residency.

• <u>Note:</u> If you are applying for a REAL ID, you will need your social security number card and two documents that prove you live in California.

At the appointment, you'll have your thumbprint scanned and your picture taken for the ID card.



Cost. The standard cost of a California ID is \$32. Your probation officer can complete a Verification for Reduced Fee Identification Card (DL 937) Form that reduces the cost to \$9. Bring the completed DL 937 Form with you to your DMV appointment. There is no fee for people 62 years old or older.



DRIVER'S LICENSE

If you want to operate a motor vehicle, you'll need a California driver's license. In addition to the steps and requirements associated with the California ID card, you'll need to pass a knowledge test and a driving test to obtain your license.



Knowledge test. You must pass the knowledge test before taking the driving test. Visit www.dmv.ca.gov to schedule your knowledge test at a local DMV office. Before taking the knowledge test, you can read the California Driver Handbook and take practice tests at www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/driver-handbooks.

To pass the knowledge test, you must get at least 30 questions right out of 36. You will have three chances to take the test. If you fail a test, you can take the test again immediately. If you fail the test all three times, you must start the process over by filling out a new application and paying the fees again.

Once you pass the knowledge test, you'll receive an instruction permit that allows you to drive with another adult who has a driver's license for up to 12 months.



Driving test. Once you have passed the knowledge test, you'll need to pass the driving test. Visit www.dmv.ca.gov to schedule your driving test at a local DMV office. The driving test is divided into two parts:

- (1) **Pre-drive safety check:** Determines whether your vehicle meets the minimum DMV safety standards and whether you are familiar with the operation of your vehicle.
- 2 Driving performance evaluation: Behind-the-wheel driving test with a DMV examiner who evaluates your driving skills.

Cost. The cost of the instruction permit, which you'll pay when you take the knowledge test, is \$37. The cost of the driving test is \$7.

Once you have a California driver's license, the card must be in your possession anytime you drive a vehicle. It is illegal to drive without a driver's license or with an expired driver's license.

DRIVER'S LICENSES FOR UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS

In 2013, California passed Assembly Bill 60, which allowed the DMV to issue driver's licenses to applicants who are unable to provide proof of legal immigration status in the US but who can: (1) meet all other requirements to get a license, and (2) provide satisfactory proof of identity and California residency.



To apply for an AB 60 driver's license:

- ⊘ Complete the Driver's License or Identification (DL/ID) Card Application.
- ✓ Study for the driver's license knowledge test
- ⊘ Visit a DMV office, where you will:
 - Provide your proof of identity and California residency. A list of documents that will satisfy these requirements is available here: www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/uploads/2020/06/ residency_docslist.pdf.
 - Pay the nonrefundable application fee.
 - Have your thumbprint scanned.
 - Pass a vision exam.
 - Have your photo taken.
 - Pass the knowledge test(s).
 - Take a behind-the-wheel driving test (if applicable). You may call 1-800-777-0133 during the regular business hours to make an appointment.
 - Provide proof of financial responsibility (auto insurance) that meets or exceeds California insurance requirements.

PUBLIC BENEFITS

Once you are released from prison or jail, you may be eligible for a number of federal, state, and local benefit programs. Although the process may be complicated and confusing at times, there are organizations and people whose job it is to help you apply for and receive benefits. Your probation officer can also answer questions and provide support.

TYPES OF BENEFITS

CalFresh

CalFresh is California's food stamp program. CalFresh issues monthly electronic benefits that can be used to buy most foods at markets and food stores. You can usually qualify if you are unemployed, work part-time, or receive public assistance.

CalWORKs

CalWORKs is a public assistance program that provides cash aid and services to eligible families with at least one child. Families that apply and qualify for ongoing assistance receive money each month to help pay for housing, food, and other necessary expenses.

General Assistance (GA)

GA provides cash for low- or no-income adults without dependent children.

Medi-Cal

Medi-Cal provides health insurance for low-income children and adults in California.

Medicare

Medicare provides health insurance for individuals 65 and over and individuals under 65 with disabilities who are eligible for Social Security Disability Income.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

SSI provides monthly income to people who have limited income and few resources. SSI is for people who are 65 or older and people of any age who are blind or have disabilities.

Social Security Disability Income (SSDI)

SSDI pays disability benefits to insured individuals who are unable to work because of a serious medical condition that is expected to last at least a year or result in death. These benefits are available no matter what your age if you have enough work credits and have a severe physical or mental disability.

Social Security retirement benefits

Social Security retirement benefits are monthly payments available to people who are age 62 or older. The amount paid is based on each individual's pre-retirement income and lifetime earnings.

Veterans benefits

Veterans benefits are available to military veterans through the U.S. Veterans Administration and include education payments, health insurance coverage, disability compensation, pension payments, life insurance, and low-interest home loans.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

WIC promotes healthy eating among low-income families by providing nutrition advice, help with breastfeeding, and money to buy healthy food. WIC serves pregnant and breastfeeding women with children under 5 years old. Foster parents, guardians, and single fathers who have custody of their children can also get WIC.















After you apply, you may be contacted by a benefit eligibility worker who will ask you questions to confirm your eligibility. You may also be asked to provide the following items:

- Photo identification
- Proof of income
- Proof of address
- Social security number
- Work or school status

Some benefits are denied initially but approved when you appeal. If you are denied benefits, you are encouraged to appeal. Contact the appropriate benefits office and request help submitting an appeal.

You can apply for Medi-Cal, SSI (reinstate applications only), SSDI, and Veterans Benefits while you are still incarcerated. All prisons have a benefits worker who helps inmates complete applications for benefits prior to being released. Request to speak to the benefits worker as soon as possible once you know you are being released to begin the paperwork.

Some benefits cannot be established until after your release. These include Social Security retirement benefits, new SSI applications, GA, CalFresh, CalWORKS, and WIC.





INTERNET ACCESS, CELLULAR PHONES, AND COMPUTERS

You will need a phone and internet access to contact the organizations listed in this directory and learn more about the services they provide. A phone and internet access will also be important in other aspects of your reentry process.

If you need a phone or internet access when you return home, first talk to your probation officer to see if they can provide assistance. The Alameda County Probation Department often has access to free phones and funding to pay phone and internet bills.

If this support is not available through the Probation Department, you can use the following resources to access phones, computers or tablets, and internet service at low or no cost.



TRANSPORTATION

There are many ways to get where you need to go in Alameda County. You can drive, use rideshare companies like Uber or Lyft, or use public transportation. You can also use electric scooters or rental bikes.

If you have challenges with transportation, discuss your options with your probation officer. The Alameda County Probation Department often has free transportation passes for clients.

PUBLIC TRANSIT

In Alameda County, the two main public transit systems are Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) and AC Transit. BART is the public train system that serves San Francisco, the East Bay, and the South Bay. AC Transit is Alameda County's bus system.

CLIPPER CARD



To ride both BART and AC Transit, you will need a Clipper card. Clipper cards save you money on rides. For instance, you will save \$0.50 on a one-way trip from MacArthur BART Station to Fremont BART Station when you use a Clipper card instead of a BART ticket.

You can order a Clipper card online or purchase one at a retail location. To find a retail location near you, visit www.clippercard.com/ClipperWeb/ get.html. A Clipper card costs \$3. You can add money to your Clipper card as you go, or you can have it automatically reload from your bank account once you get below a certain amount.

Visit www.clippercard.com/ClipperWeb/reload.html to reload your Clipper card online or find a retail location where you can add money. You can add money in person at any BART station.



If you are 65 years old or older, you can get a senior Clipper card to receive significant discounts on BART or bus rides. For instance, you will save \$3.00 on a one-way trip from MacArthur BART Station to Fremont BART Station when you use a Clipper card instead of a BART ticket.

Visit www.clippercard.com/ClipperWeb/discounts.html to apply for a senior Clipper card. You will need to submit a copy of your driver's license, California ID, or birth certificate to prove your age.

If you are under 65 but have a qualifying disability, you can apply for a Regional Transportation Connection (RTC) Clipper card to receive discounted fares. Visit www.511.org/transit/rtc-card/ eligibility to determine if you are eligible for an RTC card.

511

511 is both a free, one-stop phone service and a website for transportation information in the Bay Area. 511 provides up-to-the-minute information on traffic conditions and driving times, as well as route and fare information for public transit systems. 511 is available 24-hours a day, 7 days a week.

Dial 5-1-1 on your phone or visit www.511.org. If you have any questions about a Clipper card, dial 5-1-1 and say "Clipper."

EDUCATION

Whether you are interested in completing high school, taking a few college courses, or earning a college degree, there are organizations in Alameda County that are ready to support you in meeting your education goals.



HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA OR EQUIVALENCY EXAM

Certain jobs require that you have a high school diploma or a high school equivalency certificate (e.g. GED). Depending on your job goals and interests, you may need to obtain a diploma or high school equivalency certificate if you don't have one already.

High school diploma: You can obtain a high school diploma by completing a minimum number of classes as determined by the state and your local school district. There are 13 one-year courses required by the state through the California Education Code. Most school districts in California require between 22 and 26 one-year courses for graduation.

High school equivalency certificate: You can obtain a high school equivalency certificate by completing a series of tests that demonstrate you have the same skills and knowledge as a high school graduate. California has approved the use of two high school equivalency tests for students 18 years old and older:

- ► GED®: www.ged.com
- HiSET®: www.hiset.ets.org

EMPLOYMENT

There are a range of employment services available to you in Alameda County based on your interests, skills, and work experience.



TYPES OF EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT

Work readiness training

Work readiness training helps people practice and develop 'soft' skills that are needed to be successful in any type of job. Training might include learning how to manage your time, how to communicate with coworkers and supervisors, and how to act professionally.

Employment skills training

Employment skills training is training that helps you develop professional skills for a specific job or industry. Training programs can be paid or unpaid. Once your training is complete, the programs often help you write a resume and cover letter and try to connect you with job opportunities.

Pre-apprenticeship training

Pre-apprenticeship training prepares you for a formal apprenticeship program in a specific trade. Apprenticeship programs are paid programs that provide the training and credentials you need to enter a full-time union job in a field such as construction or health care. Pre-apprenticeship programs provide training to help you get accepted into a formal apprenticeship program.

Transitional work

Transitional work is a short-term job that gives you an opportunity to make money while you participate in employment skills training and look for permanent employment.

Career coaching

Career coaching helps you determine what type of work you are best suited for and prepares you to obtain employment in that field. This may involve career assessments to identify your skills and interests. It may also include developing a career plan, discussing options for furthering your education or skills, developing a resume, and preparing for job interviews.

Job search and placement

Organizations that provide job search and placement services will connect you to companies that are hiring and support you in getting hired. These organizations will also help you develop a resume and cover letters that are tailored to the jobs you are interested in.

Support services

At the beginning of your job search, you may need support with things like obtaining important documents (for example, a California ID) or finding housing. Some employment providers offer these extra support services to ensure you are successful in achieving your employment goals.





COUNSELING & MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health refers to a person's emotional, psychological, and social well-being. Mental health issues (like anxiety, depression, or other disorders) are common and can affect how you think, feel, and act. They can affect how you handle stress, relate to others, and make choices.

If at some point you need help with a mental health issue, there are a variety of free and lowcost options for guidance, support, and treatment. You can seek care from a counselor, therapist, psychologist, or psychiatrist. You can opt for individual, family, or group therapy.

It may take some time to determine which mental health services are most helpful for you, but once you get the right treatment, it can make a big difference in your mood, your relationships, and your success in the reentry process.

If you need support or treatment for a mental health issue, start by calling the Alameda County Behavioral Health Care Services referral helpline. A trained and caring professional will assess your needs and refer you to a treatment provider close to you.



CHILD SUPPORT

Child support is the amount of money that a court orders one parent to pay the other parent every month to contribute to the child's living expenses.

If you cannot pay child support or are falling behind on your payments, contact the Alameda County Department of Child Support Services as soon as possible for help changing your child support amount. You are responsible for paying the full amount of child support owed until a judge changes your child support order.

VOTING

In the United States, voting has been a right denied to many, including African American men until 1869 and all women until 1920. Until the Voting Rights Act of 1965, many southern states used poll taxes, literacy tests, and other measures to prevent people of color from voting. To this day, states have different policies on whether people with a criminal record can vote.

No matter what your political views, it is important to vote in each election in which you are eligible in order to make your voice heard.



ELIGIBILITY TO VOTE

A person becomes eligible to vote when they turn 18.

****In California, having a criminal record does NOT prohibit you from voting.** You are still eligible to vote if you meet one of the following criteria:

- You are on any type of probation, including mandatory supervision and post-release community supervision (PRCS)
- ✓ You are in county jail serving a misdemeanor sentence
- ✓ You are in county jail because jail time is a condition of probation
- ✓ You have completed parole

You are **NOT** eligible to vote in California if you meet one of the following criteria:

- Solution You are currently imprisoned (1) in state prison, or (2) in a county jail serving a state prison sentence
- ⊗ You are currently on parole

REGISTERING TO VOTE

- Online: You can complete an online voter registration form at www.registertovote.ca.gov or www.vote.org.
- By mail: Mail-in registration forms are widely available at most county buildings, post offices, libraries, and DMV offices
- In person: You can register in person at the Alameda County Registrar of Voters office located at 1225 Fallon Street, Oakland.



SPECIAL POPULATIONS

In addition to the resources available to the reentry population, there are resources dedicated to special populations, including seniors, veterans, recent immigants, people with disabilities, and LGBTQ+ individuals. This section also provides information for individuals who have a conviction for a sex offense.



SENIORS

If you are 60 years old or older, there are special services and resources available to you in Alameda County.

PUBLIC BENEFITS



Medicare

Medicare provides health insurance for individuals 65 and over and individuals under 65 with disabilities who are eligible for Social Security Disability Income.



Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

SSI provides monthly income to people who have limited income and few resources. SSI is for people who are 65 or older and people of any age who are blind or have disabilities.



Social Security Disability Income (SSDI)


SSDI pays disability benefits to insured individuals who are unable to work because of a serious medical condition that is expected to last at least a year or result in death. These benefits are available no matter what your age if you have enough work credits and have a severe physical or mental disability.

SPECIAL HOUSING

Alameda County Social Services Agency provides rental assistance to help low-to-moderate income families with dependent children, seniors 60 and over, and disabled individuals who live in Alameda County.

There is also permanent supportive housing in Alameda, which is intended to help homeless persons with disabilities live independently. Individuals are connected to permanent, affordable housing and provided supportive services in areas such as mental health and substance use.



AT-HOME CARE/NURSING

The Alameda County Social Services Agency administers an In-Home Supportive Services program that provides assistance to older adults and individuals with disabilities so they can remain safely in their homes.

To be eligible to receive In-Home Supportive Services, you must:

- 🕑 Be a California resident
- Have a valid social security number (SSN)
- ✓ Qualify for full-scope Medi-Cal

TRANSPORTATION

BART & AC Transit

If you are under 65 but have a qualifying disability, you can apply for a Regional Transportation Connection (RTC) Clipper card to receive discounted fares.

Visit www.511.org/transit/rtc-card/eligibility to determine if you are eligible for an RTC card.

If you are 65 years old or older, you can get a senior Clipper card to receive significant discounts on BART or bus rides. For instance, you will save \$3.00 on a one-way trip from MacArthur BART Station to Fremont BART Station when you use a Clipper card instead of a BART ticket.

REGISTRATION

() IMPORTANT ()

If you are required to register as a sex offender under Penal Code 290, you have five working days after you are released from jail or prison or placed on community supervision (probation or parole) to register. You must register in person with the police department in the city where you live or with the county sheriff's department if you live in an unincorporated area. Ask your probation officer for support if you are unsure where or how to register.

Each year, you will be required to re-register within five days of your birthday. If you ever move, you must notify the police departments in your new and previous cities regarding your change in residence.

Tiered sex offender registry system

In January 2021, California implemented a tiered sex offender registry system. Registrants are now classified into three tiers based on severity of the crime and criminal history. Tier 3 offenders (most serious) are still be required to register for life, but Tier 1 and Tier 2 offenders may petition for removal from the registry after 10 and 20 years, respectively, if they have not committed a new sex offense. As of July 2021, Tier 1 and Tier 2 offenders who have already served the minimum year requirement are able to petition for removal from the sex offender registry.

Public registry database

The California Attorney General's Office maintains a website - www.meganslaw.ca.gov - that provides public information on people who are registered as sex offenders in California. Any member of the public can search this database by a specific person's name or by a location and retrieve detailed information on each registrant.

HOUSING & EMPLOYMENT

If you are required to register as a sex offender under Penal Code 290, you will face some restrictions on where you can live and places you can work. These restrictions are determined on a case-by-case basis and take into account each person's specific offense and criminal history. Talk to your probation officer as soon as possible to make sure you understand any restrictions that apply to you.

RECENT IMMIGRANTS

You are eligible for all services delivered by Alameda County agencies regardless of your immigration status.



BENEFITS FOR IMMIGRANTS

Immigrants who meet any of the criteria below are eligible for many of the benefits described under the *Public benefits* section of this directory.

- ⊘ Have a green card
- ⊘ Have refugee status, asylum, or parolee status
- ⊘ Have, or are applying for, a U-Visa or T-Visa
- ⊘ Are an applicant for Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) relief
- ✓ Are a Cuban or Haitian entrant

Public benefits

Undocumented immigrants who do not meet the above criteria can still receive assistance through the following state benefit programs:



<u>California Food Assistance Program (CFAP)</u>: California provides statefunded food stamps through CFAP for eligible non-citizens who do not qualify for federal benefits.



<u>Cash Assistance Program for Immigrants (CAPI)</u>: CAPI is a state-funded program designed to provide monthly cash benefits to elderly, blind, and disabled non-citizens who are ineligible for SSI solely due to their immigration status.



<u>Medi-Cal:</u> Medi-Cal provides health insurance for low-income children and adults in California. Undocumented immigrants are eligible for emergency services, pregnancy-related services, and long-term care through Medi-Cal.



Refugee Cash Assistance (RCA): RCA provides cash and medical assistance for non-citizen refugees without children who are not otherwise eligible for any other cash aid.

To apply for these benefit programs, contact an Alameda County Social Services Agency office using information provided under the *Public benefits* section of this directory.

CA driver's license for undocumented immigrants

In 2013, California passed Assembly Bill 60, which allowed the DMV to issue driver's licenses to applicants who are unable to provide proof of legal immigration status in the U.S. but can (1) meet all other requirements to get a license, and (2) provide satisfactory proof of identity and California residency.



To apply for an AB 60 driver's license:

- ✓ Complete the Driver's License or Identification (DL/ID) Card Application.
- Study for the driver's license knowledge test.
- ✓ Visit a DMV office, where you will:
 - Provide your proof of identity and California residency. A list of documents that will satisfy these requirements is available here: www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/ uploads/2020/06/residency_docslist.pdf.
 - Pay the nonrefundable application fee.
 - Have your thumbprint scanned.
 - Pass a vision exam.
 - Have your photo taken.
 - Pass the knowledge test(s).
 - Take a behind-the-wheel driving test (if applicable). You may call (800) 777-0133 during the regular business hours to make an appointment.
 - Provide proof of financial responsibility (auto insurance) that meets or exceeds California insurance requirements.




